Mad Effigy Of Mrs. Yost Found At Residence

As the spotlight on yesterday's triple tragedy shifted this morning from the blood-stained office of Attorney Tucker Moroose to the lonely home of Ernie Lee Yost on Hampton road, Coroner D. E. Kidd announced that he would empanel a coroner's jury this afternoon to investigate the fatal shooting.

After visiting the scene of the shooting in the McCrory building in Adams street, the jury of six will go to funeral homes in Mannington, Monongah and Fairmont to view the bodies of Yost, the slayer, who died at 12:20 o'clock this morning, and his two victims, Mrs. Yost and Attorney Moroose.

Moroose will be buried on Saturday, and Mr. and Mrs. Yost on Sunday.

The Yost Home

"Hell's Half Acre" are the words chiseled into the stone steps which give entrance to the Yost property on a hill high above Chesapeake. Those words, apparently newly cut, assumed a terrible meaning yesterday.

It is an attractive stone and frame residence—from the outside—and is approached by its own winding road neatly outlined by a low stone wall. But the inside is another story. It was there that Yost, alone and bitter, fabricated a horrible revenge—on the world and on himself.

It was a quiet place today, a haunted place. Crouched against the back door was the family dog, a small, black cocker spaniel kind of dog, waiting for a master and mistress who will not return.

Inside The House

Inside the house, which Yost intended for destruction yesterday by means of a fire bomb, in an obvious effort to erase all memory of the Yosts from the face of the earth, there was a confusion of clothing and furniture which reminded the onlooker that this was a home from which a woman had been absent for about two months.

There was an odor of burned wood and in the long, dark hallway could be seen the beginnings of what Yost had intended as a funeral pyre, the half-burned floor and walls which had been baked by
